THE FAMILY OF BASIL AND CLARA ALBUQUERQUE of BOLAR and of Mother Sylvia, Superior General, Apostolic Carmel



Mother Sylvia

Basil was the younger of two sons of Pascal Albuquerque (1820-1884), who with his brother Alexis founded Mangalore's first Catholic-owned tile factory in 1868. The two brothers later set up independent businesses under the names "P. Albuquerque & Sons" and "A. Albuquerque & Sons".

The tile factory of Pascal Albuquerque passed into the hands of Basil's elder brother John Salvador Albuquerque. Basil was in government service; he attained the rank of tahsildar – which was a powerful position to hold in 19th century Mangalore.

Basil married Clara Fernandes, who hailed from a branch of the Fernandes Prabhu family of Thonse, Kallianpur, that had settled in Mangalore. Clara's mother Piedade Coelho belonged to the Falnir Coelho family; she was a daughter of Peter Venantius Coelho, a leading figure in the Mangalorean community of the 19th century.

Mother Sylvia, the second Indian Superior General of the Apostolic Carmel, was the youngest daughter of Basil and Clara.

THE SECOND GENERATION

They married at Codialbail Chapel on 15 June 1887. They had 7 children - all baptized at Rosario Cathedral, except for Justin who was baptized at Udipi. Basil, who was in Govt. service, retired as Tahsildar. He died in 1921 and is buried in Rosario Cathedral. His widow Clara later settled in Madras with her son Aloysius. She died there in 1937; her remains were brought back to Mangalore and aid by the side of her husband at the Cathedral.

She joined the Order in 1922 following which she did the B.A. at the newly-founded St Agnes College, securing the Henry Stone Gold Medal for English and the Cardoza & Todhunter Prizes for distinction in Political Science & Economics. She later lectured at the college, holding the positions of Directress of the Sodality, Novice Mistress, and finally Superior General (1947-59).



Family photograph: 1924

This photograph was taken three years after the death of Basil Severine Albuquerque in 1921. His widow Clara is seated second from the left. On one side of her is her brother Fr Denis Fernandes, S.J. (centre of the photograph), while at the extreme left is her eldest son Aloysius (A.P.C. Albuquerque), who was not then married. To the right is her daughter Lidwyn, her son-in-law Pascal (Babi) Mathias and their two elder daughters Dinah (b 1920) and Vera (b 1924).

Clara's other children Denis, Justin, and Clotilda are not in the photograph. Denis and Clotilda had probably already joined their respective religious orders, while Justin, an army officer, was posted in Bangalore (he had married the previous year).

Fr Denis Fernandes, an erudite Jesuit, was Headmaster of St Aloysius High School from 1918 to 1922, when nearly all positions of authority were held by the European Jesuits. More generally, he was renowned as a linguist, writer, teacher and preacher. As a writer, he succeeded Fr Moore, S.J., as editor of the *Mangalore Magazine* (1908-14), and was responsible for the publication of Fr Thomas Stephen's *Christian Purana*. As a preacher, he fostered a number of vocations, especially to convents. He was a major advisor to Mother Aloysia, Superior General of the Apostolic Carmel (1909-27) in her efforts to start a First Grade College for Women – resulting in the foundation of St Agnes College in 1921.

THE THIRD GENERATION

[1.1] FR DENIS ALBUQUERQUE, S.J.

Fr Denis Albuquerque was a prominent Jesuit priest. A teacher of English and logic, he succeeded Fr Manuel Coelho as editor of the *Aloysian* in 1936. He was Director of the Sodality and Spiritual Director of the Calix Society. He was also the author of the hymn book *Cantate Domino*. In later life, he made a study of Konkani phonetics with the use of hearing and reading aids.

January 1936

(Golden Jubilee)

The members of the Calix Society met at the Retreat House, Jeppoo, on January 2nd, to felicitate their Spiritual Director, Rev. Fr. D.J. Albuquerque Pai, S.J., on his completion of fifty years' life in the Society of Jesus. Rev. Fr. Gilbert Gonsalves, Spirit Director of the Calix Unit in Kulshekar, presided. The Jubilarian is now 73 years old.

Mr. Julian Lobo read an address in which the Jubilarian was referred to as an able priest, professor and writer. Rev. Br. Bonaventure O.C. spoke describing the essentials of the Calix Society, so ably directed by the Jubilarian. The practice of mutual confession among the members, he said, would help them to spiritualise continued sobriety. Christ's advice to Peter "once converted, confirm thy brethren" was eminently applicable to the Calix members. A look at the members at their meetings was sure to hearten all those who were interested in

Dr. Miss E. Silva also spoke on the occasion. She condemned drunkenness as the cause of separation between husband and wife. It was only by the use of one's will power that one could conquer the evil. America was laudably alert to the gravity of the problem, as was evident by the work of the Calix Society there. While

Fr Rex was an eminent Jesuit priest. He was Provincial of the Madura Jesuit Province, and in 1982 was appointed Jesuit Provincial of India with headquarters at New Delhi.

Chevalier Aloysius P.C. Albuquerque, B.A.B.L., O.B.E., settled at Madras where he was the Official Assignee to the Government. He was one of the leading figures of the Mangalorean Catholic community in Madras, president of the K.C.A.,the St Vincent de Paul Society, and the Sodality of Our Lady. Awarded K.S.G. in the Eucharistic Congress of 1963.

Aloysius & Florence were married at Milagres Church on 18 Jan 1926. Their home in Madras was known as 'Bolar House'. They had five children. Aloysius died in 1965 aged 75 and Florence in 1986 aged 78.

February 1932

The Mangalorean Catholic Association, Madras, celebrated the Association Day at Bolar House, Kilpauk, the residence of Mr. A.P.C. Albuquerque, on Sunday, the 24th January 1932. Most of the members of the community resident in Madras attended and helped to make the occasion a great success. Several ladies and gentlemen took part in tennis, while others occupied themselves with cards and other amusements. A supper followed, at the end of which Mr. J.D. Mathias, M.A., L.T., proposed the toast to the community. He congratulated the Association on its great achievements in the past and wished it a yet more fruitful future. He exhorted the members to take greater interest in the problems touching the welfare of the community and to cooperate for its betterment.

November 1933 (Madras News)

The All-India Catholic Congress will be held at Loyola College, Madras, on the 27th, 28th and 29th of December. Two Mangaloreans, Messrs A.P.C. Albuquerque, B.A., B.L., and Mr. J.D. Mathias, M.A., L.T., along with others, are Secretaries to the Congress.

April 1936 (Madras News)

Mr. A.P.C. Albuquerque, B.A., B.L., Deputy Official Assignee, Madras, has been appointed Acting Official Assignee during the absence of Mr. F.H. Wilson, the Official Assignee.

From the archives of the community magazine "Mangalore"

October 1938

We are glad that the great services rendered to the Church by Mr. A.P.C. Albuquerque, Deputy Official Assignee to the Madras Government, have received recognition, by his being made a Knight of the Order of St. Gregory the Great. He belongs to a family remarkable both for brilliant gifts and for unaffected piety and loyalty to the Church. He is well-known for his kindness, hospitality, and eagerness to help others. He has done much at Madras to bring together the members of the community. Many persons he has helped over the style. He is a great social asset, being a very pleasant conversationalist and is an accomplished musician.

The New Leader says of him :- "The name of Mr. A.P.C. Albuquerque has been constantly associated with Catholic public work. His old friends will recall with pleasure that he was probably the first in Madras to realise the usefulness of social functions to draw the bonds of union closer among all Catholics. It was with this idea he started a "Catholic Dining Club" in 1922, if we are not mistaken, and Europeans, Anglo-Indians and Indians were brought together in frequent gatherings and discussed topics of Catholic interest. At one of these dinners, a spirited protest was addressed to the Madras Mail against a series of articles published against the Catholic doctrine of the Real Presence with the result that the articles were discontinued and an apology published. It was again at one of these dinners that the idea of starting St. Vincent de Paul Conferences was mooted and steps taken by the Executive Committee of the Club to initiate the work. On another occasion a sum of Rs 125 was subscribed on the spot by 32 diners in aid of the family of a deceased Catholic soldier. The social contacts thus established made representatives and leading Catholics to know one another and support Catholic public work enthusiastically. Mr. Albuquerque thus discovered the secret of Catholic organisation with the result that some years later St. Vincent de Paul Conferences were established in the various parishes of the city. He has been for several years President of the particular Council of St. Vincent de Paul Conferences and an active member of the Assumption Sodality. He was elected Prefect of the Sodality a few weeks ago for the third time. His genial ways, broad sympathies and sense of humour won for him the esteem of all Catholics. Mr. Albuquerque laboured steadily and methodically for the Eucharistic Congress."

We have received the following appreciation from Madras: "All that have had the good fortune to know Mr. Albuquerque have rejoiced at the happy news. He is the recipient of a host of congratulatory messages. One has but to glance at these to judge the great respect and esteem, people in every walk of life have for our new knight. Mr. Albuquerque is well-known in Madras and outside for his genuine and selfless labour in the cause of religion and charity. He is indeed a perfect specimen of a true Catholic layman, full of zeal and fervour. His unostentatiousness is at once so remarkable and exemplary. Catholic Madras cannot possibly forget the yeoman service he has rendered during his long sojourn in this city. The unforgettable Eucharistic Congress owed much of its success to the tireless efforts of Mr. Albuquerque. Would that our community produced a few more Catholic laymen of the type of our new Knight!

April 1939

To felicitate Mr. A.P.C. Albuquerque on the Knighthhood of the Order of St. Gregory the Great conferred upon him by H.H. the Pope, the Mangalorean Catholics in Madras got up a pleasant party on 29th ult. at Woodlands, Royapettah High Road. Many officials and non-officials, including the Archbishop of Madras, Sir Lionel and Lady Leach, justices Wadsworth, Lakshmana Rao, Pandrang Row, Venkataramana Rao and K.S. Krishnaswami Iyengar, Mr. C.J. Varkey, Minister for Education, Mr. and Mrs. F.H. Wilson, Mr. M. Ruthnaswamy, Mr. J.A. Saldanha, Dewan Bahadur and Mrs. C. Kunhiraman, Rao Bahadur and Mrs. C.J. Paul, and Mr. V.L. Ethiraj attended the function. Mr. G.A. Pais and Dr. H. Fernandez, President and Vice-President of the Association, Mr. D. Noronha, Secretary, and Mr. J.A. Pinto received the guests who, after partaking of refreshments, spent a pleasant hour in informal conversation.

Mr. and Mrs. Albuquerque were "At Home" to the Mangalorean Catholics in Madras, on Saturday the 1st April, at their residence. Tennis and other games were in the evening's programme. Dinner was served at 8 p.m. Mr. G.A. Pais proposed the toast of the popular and generous hosts in very eloquent terms. Mr. C.P. Paisley supported it energetically, Mr. Albuquerque with his well-known humour replied. After dinner those present spent a very pleasant time in music and singing popular English and Konkani songs.

June 1941

Chevalier A.P.C. Albuquerque, Deputy Official Assignee of Madras, on his first visit to Mangalore after the confermennt on him of the Knighthood of St. Gregory the Great, was entertained at a tea party by prominent Catholi citizens under the auspices of the Catholic Association on the 5th June 1941 at the Catholic Bank. There was a large gathering and His Excellency, the Bishop of Mangalore, presided at the function. Refreshments were served on a liberal scale.

His Excellency the Bishop, rising to speak, expressed great pleasure at seeing Chevalier Albuquerque again in their midst after many years of absence. he had known the honoured guest for a long time and recently had learnt to value, both through the Press and by personal contact, the signal services rendered by Chevalier Albuquerque to the Catholic community. His Excellency recalled with much pleasure his visit to Madras during the All-India Eucharistic Congress when he and other members of the clergy were hospitably entertained at Chevalier Albuquerque's residence. During his short stay, he had ample occasion to testify to the excellence of his host's family life and was particularly impressed by his untiring and solicitous care for the comfort of his guests in spite of multifarious duties at the Congress. Concluding, His Excellency said that he could think of no better tribute to their guest of the evening than to say that in his conversations with Archbishop Dr. Louis Mathias of Madras, His Grace invariably spoke of Chevalier Albuquerque and his activities in terms of the highest respect and admiration.

Mr. L.C. Pais, Chairman of the Mangalore Municipal Council, speaking next, said that he could add but little to the apt remarks made by His Lordship, but he would like to mention a few traits which appeared to him as outstanding features of Chevalier Albuquerque's character. One was his unbounded charity. His revered mother, the late Mrs. Clara Albuquerque used to maintain a careful register of all her relations and would help them according to their needs as occasion arose. This excellent tradition is now continued by her two lay son, Chevalier A.P.C. and Lt. Col. J.W.F. Albuquerque. Secondly, their honoured guest had under many trying cicumstances carried out distinct services to his community and religion regardless of human respect. His work at the Marian Congress of 1921 was so much appreciated that it was only his youthful age which prevented his being then offered the Knighthood of St. Gregory the Great. Now that at long last the title has come to him after a cropful of meritorious works, Mr. Pais did not hesitate to say that the life of Chevalier Albuquerque was a real model of Christian endeavour, worthy of imitation by every Catholic layman. The speaker added that when, of late, the post of Official Assignee of Madras fell vacant, all Mangalore was disappointed when Chevalier Albuquerque was not given that well-merited promotion. Mr. Pais wished the Chevalier and his family all Godspeed and said that in all their future efforts, they had the best wishes for success from the Catholic community.

Dr. L.P. Fernandes, who followed, remarked that Chevalier Albuquerque admirably answered Cardinal Newman's definition of a gentleman. During the past two years when he had come to know him more intimately than at any other time, he was most struck, apart from his truly Catholic life, by his devotion to his wife and children. He hoped that Chevalier Albuquerque would continue to remain a beacon of light to our community and a source of inspiration to all young men. Dr. Fernandes then thanked His Lordship for having consented to preside over the function, and also Messrs. A. Castelino, A.J.I. Saldanha and others who contributed to the success of the party.

Rising amidst cheers, Chevalier A.P.C. Albuquerque stated that when he came to Mangalore he was hardly prepared for so enthusiastic a reception. He was literally overwhelmed by the tributes paid to him by the various speakers and was conscious how little worthy he was of the honour done to him. Referring to the Knighthood he said it was not so much an honour to him as to the community to which he was proud to belong and added that, if there was any good in him, he owed it entirely to the fine example set before him by his parents and the education he received from his Alma Mater viz. the St. Aloysius College. When he was given the title of K.S.G., he accepted it with fear and trembling for it entailed a great responsibility in living up to the highest ideals of Catholicism. As a member of the Catholic Association of Mangalore for the past 20 years, he had been keenly following its activities through its official organ "The Mangalore" and suggested that the Association, as representing the most enlightened Catholic community of South India, should seriously think of extending its sphere of action over a wider area and of embracing many more problems of social life. Concluding, Chevalier Albuquerque said that in all his endeavours his wife had given him ready assistance and co-operation and today they both thank His Lordship and the Catholic Community for their felicitations.

September 1946

(Chevalier A.P.C. Albuquerque retires)

Mr. Albuquerque has taken leave preparatory to retirement. He was holding the post of Deputy Official Assignee. He belongs to a family that has done much social service. His brother Col. Albuquerque has made generous contributions for the education of poor students etc. Another brother is Fr. D. Albuquerque, S.J., who is well-known for his educational and literary work and for the great push he has given to retreats. A sister is the Superioress of Mary Hill Convent. Mr. A.P.C. Albuquerque is an indefatigable and zealous worker in the cause of Catholic Action and was the right hand of the Madras clergy in all Catholic social work. We understand that he has decided to resume his legal practice in Madras. We hope he will devote his spare time to social service.

April 1958

(Madras News)

At a meeting held in St. Mary's Hall on the 21st March 1958, under the presidency of His Grace the Archbishop of Madras, it was decided to form a Catholic Association of the Archdiocese of Madras-Mylapore for the defence of the rights and liberties of Catholics as citizens of India and to promote their interests of all kinds on the lines of similar Catholic Associations formed all over India and affiliated to the Catholic Union of India.

April 1965

(The late Chevalier A.P.C. Albuquerque)

Chevalier Aloysius P.C. Albuquerque, B.A., B.L., passed away at Madras on March 17th at the age of 75. The funeral, which took place the next day, was largely attended. Archbishop Mathias of Madras-Mylapore, who officiated at the obsequies, spoke appreciatively of Chev. Albuquerque's life and work. Chev. G.A. Pais, in his funeral oration at the graveside, said that Chev. Albuquerque had led a full and useful life.

Born in Bolar, Mangalore, in 1890, Chev. Albuquerque graduated from the Law College, Madras, and joined the Madras High Court, where he served as an officer with great distinction for over 30 years. He retired as Official Assignee in 1945 and thereafter practised as an Advocate.

A deeply religious man, he was of a very charitable disposition. He took an active part in many Catholic organisations, including the St. Vincent de Paul Society and the Catholic Centre. He was known for his hard work, integrity and dedicated service to the Church and people. He was made a papal knight some years ago. He leaves behind his wife and children to mourn his loss.

CHILDREN OF: [1.5] JUSTIN ALBUQUERQUE and FLORENCE PERES

They were married at Rosario Cathedral on 17 Jan 1923. Colonel Justin Albuquerque was in the I.M.S. (Indian Medical Service – run by the British military). He served in both World Wars and was the recipient of the O.B.E. in 1943. He was still in service at the time of Independence in 1947. He retired as Commandant of I.N.S. Shivaji, Bombay. After retirement he settled in Richmond Road, Bangalore; he died there on 14 March 1964. Florence (Flossie) survived him by a decade; she died on 20 Nov 1974. The family suffered another tragedy just nine days later when Basil died.

(The late Colonel J.W.F. Albuquerque, I.M.S. (Retd.)

We regret to announce the death of one of the most distinguished members of the Mangalorean Catholic Community, Colonel J.W.F. Albuquerque, I.M.S. (Retd.), at the age of 69, at Bangalore, on Saturday, March 14th. Requiem Mass for the deceased was celebrated by Rev. Fr. Cyprian Pai, S.J., at the local St. Patrick's Church the next day, and then the funeral service followed.

The funeral oration was delivered by Very Rev. Mgr. Stan. Aranjo. It was as follows:-

Much could be said of Justin and to speak of him, we would have to speak of him in the highest of terms - of his brilliant academic record at school and at the university, his distinguished career in the Indian Medical Service. He was a loving and dutiful husband, an affecionate, dutiful and provident father, so true in his friendship and so loval to his associates.

But it seems to me that he could be best descibed, that we would be going to the core of him, if we descibed him as a *man of duty*. He had an unerring sense of duty - whatever his Faith, his upbringing, his high intelligence and great experience indicated to him as duty -he accepted as such, and to the accomplishment of that duty he brought the best that was in him. Nothing was too great or too small, if it happened to fall within what he considered his duty - for him it was important, to be done and to be done well.

He was a founding member and the first President of the Catholic Medical Guild of St. Luke. Associated with the Guild for the last few years, I had the opportunity of observing him at close quarters and seeing in operation his unwavering sense of duty. Retiring after long years of service, he might have thought of his comfort and convenience; he might have lived a retired and leisurely life. His keen insight into conditions, and the deep compassion that was in him, made him aware of the need of the Guild and pointed to the active role he had to play in it. He reserved for himself tasks that he would never have accepted in other circumstances. Whether in sun or rain, whatever the rebuffs or irritations he had to suffer - and we know how sensitive he was - he continued undaunted, because it was in the line of duty. In the same line of duty, he was an example of punctuality and regularity at meetings, so scrupulous in his transactions, so correct in his administration. Holy Scripture speaks of the "just man" - the man who is just - who does his duty by God and his fellow men. Justin was one such "just man". There seems something predestined about his very name - Justin.

December 1943

(The late Mr. A.L.P. Mathias)

By the passing away of Mr. Aloysius L. Pascal Mathias on the 27th October 1943, Mangalore has lost one of its most prominent citizens. Born on 18th October 1893, the late Mr. Mathias was the eldest son of the late Dewan Bahadur Chevalier S.L. Mathias, K.S.G., a name illustrious in the coffee and tea planting world.

Dewan Bahadur Mathias' head office was at Karkal and later when it was transferred to Mangalore, the late Mr. Mathias was appointed Manager. When the father died about 3 years ago, the brunt of the work fell on the shoulders of the deceased. He carried on the work of the firm with great ability. He was unsparing in his attention to duty and in the end his health suffered. The cardiac trouble from which he ailed proved fatal inspite of the bes medical attention. He bore his illness patiently and died fully fortified by the rites of the church.

Mr. Mathias was of a gentle and amiable disposition. He was kind and charitable. He did not mix himself in politics as he loved a quiet life. His private life was edifying and unostentatious and he was greatly devoted to his wife and children, in whose midst he spent all his leisure hours. He had no relish for any kind of amusements outside his home, for all his love and joy were centred in his family. He was a prominent member of the Milagres Church Board, Beggar Relief Society, St. Vincent de Paul Society, etc. He leaves behind his widow, a son and four daughters one of whom is a Sister of the Apostolic Carmel. To him could well be applied the verse "Behold an Israelite in whom there is no guile." (St. John I, 47.).

December 1943

(The late Mrs. Lidwyn Mathias)

Mrs. Lydwin Albuquerque, widow of Mr. A.L.P. (Babi) Mathias, Coffee Planter, of Kaprigudda, Mangalore, passed away on August 11 at the age of 68. Her funeral, which took place the next day at the Milagres Church was largely attended. The Bishop of Mangalore, who is a relative of the deceased lady, officiated at the church and graveside. She is buried inside the church beside her husband. She leaves behind one son and four daughters, one of whom is an A.C. nun.

[1.7] MOTHER SYLVIA, A.C.

She joined the Apostolic Carmel in 1922, following which she completed the B.A. degree at the newly-founded St Agnes College, securing the Henry Stone Gold Medal for English and the Cardoza and Todhunter Prizes for distinction in Political Science and Economics. She subsequently lectured at the college, and despite poor health, she held the responsible posts of Directress of the Sodality, local Superior, Novice Mistress, finally being elected Superior General of the Congregation (1949-57).

April 1977

(Obituary: by Patricia Saldanha)

In the passing away of Sr. Sylvia, AC, on the 24th February, at Bangalore, not only the Apostolic Carmel, but society and the Catholic community have lost a pearl of great price.

Hailing from a talented and well-known family of Mangalore, Sr. Sylvia (nee Clotilda Albuquerque) was the daughter of Basil and Clara Albuquerque. She was 74 years of age, of which 54 were dedicated to the service of the Apostolic Carmel.

As a young nun, Sr. Sylvia was sent for higher studies and her achievement was a rare distinction for St. Agnes College. She secured a double First Class at the B.A. Degree Examination, and was awarded the Henry Stone Gold Medal for English and the Cardoza and Todhunter Prizes for distinction in Political Science and Economics. We do not know what other academic glories were in store for her. But her health broke down. She was a victim of brain fever and was unconscious for weeks. But God had already shaped her future. Though in many, this illness might have left an impaired intellect, Sr. Sylvia recovered fully and resumed the regular routine of the A.C. way of life. She was a lecturer for many years at St. Agnes College, and those who came in contact with her can truly say that her brain was tuned to a delicate pitch, her intelligence was of a rare calibre which sparkled with extraordinary brilliance. As a young Professor, she won the hearts of all her students. To know her was to love her, they said.

In spite of her frail constitution, she held responsible posts of Directress of the Sodality, local Superior, Novice Mistress, and finally she was elected Superior General of the Congregation for 12 years. A woman of deep faith and silent prayer, gifted with qualities of heead an heart, Sr. Sylvia guided the destinies of the A.C. for two full terms. The Institute progressed, more foundations were made, and the A.C. grew under the gentle touch of this delicate instrument of God.

Through the years, those who knew Sr. Sylvia appreciated her nobility and charm of manner. Modest and unassuming at all times, still the impact of her gentle words of wisdom was also felt far and wide. She was the soul of justice and righteousness: be they great or small, rich or poor, she was fond of all and showed no partiality or favouritism. One could go up to her in dire distress and her quiet counselling left them soothed and satisfied. She offered ready comfort and encouragement to those whose best efforts had failed, by pointing out to them the joys of the also ran. In short our young women were the better for having known Sr. Sylvia. The noble ideals inculculated in her will always be remembered.

Devote as she was to the call of duty, she was never satisfied with less than the best effort. Once she laid down office, her health broke down completely. She recovered, but her clarity of intellect was obscured somewhat. Her spirit of prayer, service and deep spirituality, however, sustained her in trial and she made a holocaust of her life. Hr last years of, perhaps, humiliation and great suffering, she bore with resignation, and were an acceptance on her part of whatever came her way, the cross or the crown.

Since January 1977, her condition deteriorated and this soul, beloved of God and man, suffered intense pain and agony. Fortified by the rites of the Church, comforted by the constant care and prayers of her sisters in religion, cheered by the smiling faces of her relations, Sr. Sylvia gently passed away on 24th February. Her saintliness of life, her sweetness of soul, her patience in suffering, will never be forgotten. Her spirit will live in her Sisters who knew her guiding hand; it will live in the hearts of all her friends and relations who loved her and owe her a deep debt of gratitude.

Let me now say a few words about Claire, who is affectionately called Beeba.



Many of us volunteers who serve in the English Campus had a really wonderful 2014 New Year's gift - we started our 16-day directed Ignatian retreat on 01 January night. For most of us, it was the first time we were attending an Ignatian directed retreat. I know I was really looking forward to this special retreat experience. 

He headed the list of successful students also in the High School Public Examination. He has all along been holding the top place in his class. His elder brother, Joseph, now studying in London, passed third in the Presidency in the Intermediate Examination. Both the boys had their school career at Montfort Boys' High School at Yercaud, and their College studies at Loyola College, Madras.

April 1936

We are glad that are youth are acquitting themselves well in this College. Mr Allan Gonsalves of the Junior B.A. Class won three prizes at the recent College prize giving, as well as a gold medal. Mr V.H. Coelho, of the Senior Intermediate Class also won 2 prizes.

The names of two members of our Community appear in the list of 38 candidates published in th order of merit by the Gazette of India in the recent Indian Audits and Accounts Service Examination held by the Federal Service Commission at New Delhi. These two are: (1) Mr Allan J. Gonsalves, B.A., (Hons.), son of Mr S.J. Gonsalves, B.A., Public Prosecutor, Ootacamund, and (2) Mr Hugh F. Pinto, B.Sc. (Hons). Only the former, who passed 3rd in the list, has been called up for appointment so far as known at present.

September 1941

Mr Allan J. Gonsalves, son of Mr S.J. Gonsalves of Ootacamund, has been posted to an appointment in the Imperial Audit Service in the Accountant General's Office, Madras.

December 1946

Mr. Allan Gonsalves, son of Mr. S.G. Gonsalves, the well-known Advocate of Ootacamund, who had a brilliant academical career and passed into the Indian Accounts Service, has resigned to work with his father as Advocate. He has apprenticed himself to Mr Bantwal Seetharama Rao of Madras. We are glad that he has decided to join the legal profession which will give ample scope for his undoubted talents. Government service is losing its charm with the advent of the National Government. This is good for the country which has been deprived hitherto of the services of some of its best men by the attraction of security of service, power and high salaries, offered by the Imperial and All-India services. We may incidentally mention that Mr Gonsalves is engaged to be married to a daughter of Colonel Albuquerque.

[1.5.3] AIR VICE MARSHALL PETER ALBUQUERQUE



Peter, born in 1927, graduated from Guindy Engineering College in 1949, and joined the Indian Air Force the same year. He passed out, standing first, from the Air Force Technical College, Jallahalli, Bangalore. He was posted at Agra and at Air Headquarters, New Delhi, and was then selected for a post-graduate course in Avionics at the College of Aeronautics, Cranfield, England.

He was deputed to H.A.L. for the setting up of the Flight Testing of the Maruthi and Kiran Aircraft. Thereafter he commanded the Air Force Station, Gwalior, during the 1971 War. He started the Faculty of Management and Advanced Technology in 1973 and was awarded the AVSM in 1975. That same year, he was specially selected for the Higher Defence Management course at the National Defence College, New Delhi. He was Project Director of the I.I.O. in the Ministry of Defence, which aimed to improve the combat efficiency of the Jaguar Aircraft.

He attained the rank of Air Commodore in 1976 and Air Vice Marshall in 1981. Following his retirement in 1983 he was Consultant to the Ministry of Defence at New Delhi.

In 1975, while holding the rank of Group Captain, he was awarded the Ati Vishist Seva Medal (AVSM):

Group Captain Peter Dennis Antony Albuquerque was commissioned in the Aeronautical Engineering (Electronics) Branch of the Indian Air Force in January, 1950. He has held with credit important staff appointments at Air Headquarters and has commanded a Base Repair Depot. Towards the end of 1972, a decision was taken to form the ââ,¬Å"Faculty of Management Studies and Advanced Technology" for imparting education in management science to senior Technical Officers of the Air Force. The instructional staff consisting of only four members of the directing staff, was provided in the establishment, although a variety of subjects is required to be taught on management science. The task of setting up this Faculty and to commence the first course in April, 1973 was assigned to Group Captain Albuquerque in February. 1973. He set about his task with great vigour and zeal and with the help of his three other officers, was ready to commence the first Senior Technical Officers' Management Course right on schedule in April, 1973. Undaunted by the heavy odds, particularly due to shortage of time and lack of a adequate funds and manÃ,Âpower he cheerfully led his team of officers, and worked for very long hours every day and gave concrete shape to the plans which he so methodically prepared to establish this first ever Air Force institution for modern management training. For this purpose, he had to maintain public relations with other management institutions in the country to draw upon their experience and expertise during this very vital formative period of the Faculty of Management Studies and Advanced Technology. Throughout the period of his tenure as Officer-in-Charge Faculty of Management Studies and Advanced Technology, he has been personally conducting and directing classes, discussions and lectures, and quite often going on tours with the participating officers, for heir project studies at far flung places, to give his personal guidance to them.


Group Captain Peter Dennis Antony Albuquerque has thus rendered distinguished service of an exceptional order.

In March 1963 Basil was posted to Geneva where he worked for the International Telecommunications Union, Department of Finance as Deputy Chief of Finance.


Basil and Sushila had 4 children. Basil died in 1974 when his youngest child was just 1.





Sidney Pinto graduated from Loyola College, Madras, and was President of the Loyola College Branch of the South-India Catholic University Federation. In 1948, he secured the M.A. (Hons.) in Economics from Madras University followed by a Law degree from Bombay University and for some years practiced as an advocate in Bombay.

In 1956 he made a career switch to industry. He joined an industrial company run by British owners and, in 1962, the Indian subsidiary of Imperial Chemical Industries Ltd (ICI). In 1968 he was the only recruit to the proposed merchant banking unit of Grindlay's Bank, and in 1973 became Director, Merchant Banking Division of National and Grindlay's Bank. Three years later he left the bank to start a consultancy of his own.

In 1981 he was introduced to 22-year-old Uday Kotak, who hailed from a Gujarati business family. The two formed a partnership, leading to the foundation of the Kotak-Mahendra Finance Corporation in 1985. He held the post of Director of this private-sector bank for the next ten years, but was then obliged to step down as Reserve Bank regulations specified an age limit of 70.

Rosemary and Sidney were married at St. Patrick's Church, Bangalore, on 18 Feb 1957. They had no children. Rosemary died on 30 Nov 2002 - and Sidney contributed to several charitable causes in her memory.

In September 2011, at the age of 85, Sidney launched a debut novel, entitled "Louis Puchekanna - the Servant Boy from Mangalore". He died just one month later.

Maurice was the youngest of three children of this couple. He grew up in Bombay and later moved to the U.S, where he obtained an M.S. in Industrial Engineering in 1962. He subsequently went into the field of Vision Management, and attained an international reputation.

Obituary tribute to Cecilia (Cela) Mascarenhas

Cela Mascarenhas was an exceptionally bright, witty and well-traveled woman.

She earned three graduate degrees, visited more than 75 countries and even prophesied the 2007 assassination of Pakistani Prime Minister Benazir Bhutto.

As a guest columnist for the Pittsburgh Post-Gazette in 1989, she wrote about her son's graduation from Harvard, noting that Ms. Bhutto was one of the featured speakers.

"Listening to her, I get the impression that it is not fame or power that drives her but a vision for her people, a vision ... that may cost her her life some day," she wrote in the July 1989 story.

The youngest of seven children, she was born in Chakrata, India, where she excelled at academics.

"Her father was a doctor in the British Colonial Army so they moved around quite a bit," said Mrs. Mascarenhas' son, Vijay, of Denver.

She was in the top of her her high school and college graduating classes, earning a bachelor's degree and several academic accolades in 1955 from the University of Mysore.

She went on to pursue a master's degree in economics at Presidency College, in Madras, India, in 1957. She taught economics at Stella Maris College in Madras before marrying Maurice John Mascarenhas in a marriage arranged by her parents and his in September 1960. Her husband died in 1995.

"They weren't forced to marry. My grandparents arranged for my mother to meet my father and she liked him and wanted to marry him," her son explained.

By 1962, the couple emigrated to the U.S. so that Mr. Mascarenhas could pursue a graduate degree.

"They came here thinking they would go back," Vijay Mascarenhas said. "My father got an offer to get his master's degree in engineering then he got a job offer in Pittsburgh at a management consulting firm — which at the time was a new field in America — so they stayed."

Eventually, her husband began his own consulting firm, where Mrs. Mascarenhas worked as a pension fund administrator, vice president and treasurer while raising her two young sons.

When her children were older, Mrs. Mascarenhas enrolled at the University of Pittsburgh, where she earned a master's degree in English Literature in 1991 and a doctorate degree in English Literature and Cultural Studies in 2000. "We all supported her in that — she always wanted to get her Ph.D," her son said.

During the same period, she began teaching English Literature and Composition at Pitt until her retirement in 2004. She also occasionally wrote freelance stories and columns for local publications, her son remembered.

"She used to write humorous, whimsical pieces," he said.

His mother was an avid reader, and was especially fond of George Eliot's "Middlemarch, A Study of Provincial Life."

His mother also took the time to pen a series of personal memoirs, Vijay Mascarenhas said. "She wrote a number of pieces about different periods and people in her life," he said. "It was wonderful and of course now I'm so incredibly grateful that she did that, because I can't ask her."

Mrs. Mascarenhas had an active social and civic life, serving as president of the Coraopolis-Sewickley branch of American Association of University Women and on the boards of other local groups.

She loved playing bridge, lunching with friends and nights out at the theater.

"She had a more active social life than I did," her son said, laughing.

But travel was her great passion and Mrs. Mascarenhas had many unforgettable adventures, including a rare trip to the Soviet Union in the early 1980s and another to China.

"We traveled every summer together," said her son, who recalled trips to Paris, Italy, South Africa and Indonesia. "She and I were very close."

And Mrs. Mascarenhas often visited her timeshare in Hilton Head, S.C., where she went to relax and unwind.

"She had been going for at least 30 years to Hilton Head Island and she really, really looked forward to that," said her son, who said his mother was blessed to take one final trip with her friends in the weeks before her death.

"My father's ashes are scattered there and we'll be scattering her ashes there in the ocean as well," he said. "She wanted to go this time because she thought it might be her last chance to go."

Along with her son, Mrs. Mascarenhas is survived by another son, Dinesh, of Chicago; her brother David Albuquerque, of Ottawa, Canada; and two granddaughters.

The only son of the late Mr. A.L.P Mathias, the eldest son of Dewan Bahadur S.L. Mathias KSG, Mr. Mathias was born in Mangalore. He did his B.Com. and then his First Examination in Law, when business lured him away from his studies and he sallied forth as Distributor of Messrs. Ciba Pharma, Bombay. He continued this for about 3 years, when he switched over to Bombay.

In Bombay he started a new concern, Neo-Pharma (P) Limited, in collaboration with Mr. W. Weisenbach, a Swiss national, eminent in the field of pharmaceutics, and Mr. Bennet Vaz. The firm took up extensive marketing of pharmaceuticals and introduced, for the first time in India, PAS, an anti-TB drug, which has become a household word in the world of medicine in India. The firm, besides, represents manufacturers of international renown. Mr. Mathias is now the sole owner of the empire.

Not content to rest on his laurels, Mr. Mathias started Neo-Pharma Industries (P) Ltd. He also launched the Neo-Pharma Instruments Corporation to market high precision and surgical instruments of international companies. Mr. Mathias has recently taken over the Bio-Chemical and Synthetic Products Ltd., Hyderabad, in order to ensure uninterrupted supplies of PAS, the anti-TB drug.

All the above concerns of Mr. Mathias, with his dynamism and drive, have achieved spectacular dimensions.

"Cherchez la femme" is true in business as elsewhere. It is no reflection on Mr. Mathias' undoubted ability to suggest that he owes a good deal of his eminence in business to his wife Pearl (nee Colaco), herself a double graduate in Arts and Law, who is actively associated with all his concerns.

Obituary tribute to Noel Mathias: July 1989

Mr. Noel L. Mathias, one of the most eminent Mangaloreans who ever lived, was called by his creator on 28 July 1989 at Bombay. He was the grandson of the late Chevalier S.L. Mathias, the first lay President of the Catholic Association of South Kanara. He was an outstanding sportsman and the Captain of the Hockey team during his college days at Mangalore.

At the time of his death, he was the Chairman and Managing Director of the Neo Pharma group of companies, and a great many other firms.

He was well-known for his various philanthropic acts including the donation of a medical ward in his father's name at Fr. Muller's Hospital, a park at Kaprigudda, and made a sizeable donation to the KCA for their Hostel and Hall at Bandra. He was also a benefactor of the St. Elizabeth's Nursing Home, the St. Stephen's Church, the Home for the Aged at Nasik, and a great many others. He realised the eternal truth that when our creator calls us, the question he is most likely to ask us is, "What have you done for your less fortunate brethren?", rather than "How many millions have you made for yourself?". The hundreds from his munifcence are mute testimony to his understanding of the real meaning of religion.

Mr. Richard J. Gonsalves, eldest son of Mr. & Mrs. Allan Gonsalves of Ootacamund, left for Columbia University, New York City, in September, to pursue his studies for the Ph.D. in Physics. He has been appointed a Fellow of the Faculty of the Department of Physics in Columbia University. He passed the M.Sc. Physics examination from Madras Christian College with a First Class and Distinctions, and obtained the First Rank in the Madras University. At the recent Convocation held by the Madras University, he was awarded three gold medals and two other prizes in recognition of his outstanding performance in the M.Sc. Physics examination. He was also awarded the P. Subramaniam prize by the Madras Christian College.

Obituary Tribute from the University of Buffalo

Richard Gonsalves, professor emeritus of physics, died Dec. 19 after an illness of several months.

Gonsalves was a theoretical particle physicist who did groundbreaking work in quantum chromodynamics (QCD). In 1980, only a few years after the introduction of QCD as the quantum field theory of strong interactions of quarks and gluons, Gonsalves published in Physical Review Letters his most noteworthy paper, pioneering the analytic calculation of higher-order QCD corrections to electron-positron scattering.

This work enabled important tests of QCD when compared with experimental data, and was crucial for establishing this new theory. He later expanded his highly influential work to the study of the carriers of the weak nuclear force, the W and Z bosons. His detailed calculations of the properties of these particles provided firm and reliable theoretical predictions, which allowed for precision tests of the underlying theory, in particular the QCD-improved parton model, at the high-energy colliders Tevatron at Fermilab and Large Hadron Collider (LHC) at CERN.

His colleagues say his contributions remain important ingredients to the mathematical toolbox used in the ongoing search for signals of new physics beyond the Standard Model at high-energy colliders. Gonsalves joined the UB physics faculty in 1980 and served as department chair from 1996 to 2004. He received a Chancellor's Award for Excellence in Teaching in 1994. Gonsalves retired from UB in 2017.

He earned bachelor's and master's degrees in physics from the University of Madras in Madras, India, and two additional master's degrees and a doctoral degree in physics from Columbia University. Hong Luo, professor and chair of the Department of Physics, called Gonsalves "the kindest person I have ever met. He was always understanding and helpful," and a "great mentor" to faculty.

Luo noted that Gonsalves "made a lot of contributions to our education effort," including working with colleagues to streamline instruction of introductory physics classes so that students could be taught and assessed uniformly.

"During his tenure as chair, he paved the way for the transition of the department," he said, "and made it possible for the high quality of our research and education programs today that we have great pride in."

He was the founder President of Indian Python Software Society India and consultant to a number of companies across the globe. He worked as a consultant to National Resource Center for free and Open Source Software title, AU-KBC Research Center, Chennai,Tamilnadu,India. He was the founder of Indian Linux Users Group, Coimbatore and Chennai Python Users Group and many open source groups. He was a mentor to many successful FOSS activists and professionals in India. It was his great ambition to have a FOSS user-group in Coimbatore. He provided all the inspiration and physical support to start this group.

In his own words

Although he has no formal training in the IT field, Kenneth Gonsalves has been programming since 1986, starting with <u>Turbo Pascal</u>, then moving to <u>Perl</u> and finally to <u>Python</u> in 2003. Since then he has focused on Python in general and the <u>Django</u> web frame-work in particular. He is an open source enthusiast and has spoken and written on open source right from 1995 when he was first introduced to it. He has conducted over 50 seminars and workshops in python and Django. He was the founder president of the Indian Python Software Society and a member of the team that has organised the highly successful Indian python conferences from 2009 to 2011. He is now based in <u>Ooty</u> where he writes and consults on open source. He also conducts a job oriented course in python and django. His other main interest is golf and he holds an international certification as a golf referee and has refereed several national level golf tournaments. He writes a regular column called 'Foss is fun' for the <u>LFY</u> monthly.

From a green-field project initiated in 2009, IIT Mandi today has 1.4 lakh sq. mt. constructed space with residential, academic and recreational facilities at par with the best higher education institutions in the world (Wikipedia).






